- The stuff can be physical (earth) as less so (livelihoods systems).

Shelter construction. The rush to construct houses after the tsunami resulted in some new homes being constructed in unsafe areas as shown in in this photo.. Flooded homes can lead to increased risk of water-bourne disease and unsafe living conditions. Note: a newly constructed sea wall in the background aggravates the problem because it prevents rainwater from flowing out to sea. 


