- how to strengthen and support effective responses




Chapter 3: Rigon et. al Promoting children's participation in design

R4R Chapter - Women's Tenure Security

Aranki D, Cunial L, Dewast C, Farmer K, Hartman A, Petersohn N

Gap:

Increased VAW in conflict/post conflict- risk for women INTRA HH Shelter delivered to male HH Do No Harm

Women's tenure security:

Right to adequate housing Sphere Standards - Shelter S&S Programmes e.g. tenure in joint names

Research Question:

Causality between increased tenure security for women and protection against, or increased risk of violence within households

Use of reseach:

Longitudinal M&E - accountability Building capacity of S&S staff to strengthen VAW considerations in programmes Contribute to understanding of VAW in humanitarian crises How do S&S programmes that support women's security of tenure affect the dynamics of intra-HH violence



The State of Play

- 15% world's population
- Disproportionately impacted
- CRPD Art 11 Situations of Risk
- Sendai Framework, 2015
- Humanitarian Disability Charter, 2016
- Humanitarian Inclusion Standards, 2018
- IASC disability guidelines, 2019

- Awareness still not translating into action
- Limited actions not clearly resulting in improved inclusion outcomes
- Limited participation of persons with disabilities
- Concerns that current guidance is not meeting sector specific needs

The Research (Lebanon and Indonesia)

- To what extent can a co-research process, that includes researchers with disabilities contribute to improving disability inclusion within organisations?
- To what extent can this process contribute to providing technical disability expertise to shelter practitioners?


Lessons and questions:

42 institutions / 75 authors / ~50% women

Diverse range of topics - worth investigation

Less than 10% authors/contributors from LMIC institutions (<3% in abstracts)

Reconcile niche research topics with current humanitarian shelter coverage [e.g. Burkina Faso: 3-10% people receiving basic shelter assistance]
